**On Friday Dec.9th** there is a Christmas Party lunch at the School. Volunteers are needed to help prepare the lunch that is provided for the students. Usually it is a Spaghetti lunch. The students are given their teddy bear at this event.

It is a worthwhile two events and the kids really enjoy the luncheon. The staff of the school are very appreciative of what we do.

## SUMMER PARTY ROAD TRIP JOURNAL BY JOEL & PAM JUSTIN

I had been reading Charles Runyan's The Roadster Factory (TRF) newsletters for many years and have always been intrigued by the annual Summer Party TRF would have at their store in Armagh, PA. It sounded kind of like a Triumphest with lots of activities and socializing. When he didn't have it last year due to declining attendance, I floated the idea by Pam to see if she was interested in going this year. No floating was necessary as she was all in!

We planned a 2 week cross-country road trip with stops to visit our son in Flagstaff (both going and returning), my Aunt in Indiana (with a day trip to the Indianapolis Motor Speedway, Summer Party (of course), then a 4 day visit with my folks in Tennessee.

We planned to take the TR2, but didn't really want to drive it across the country, especially during this time of year with the desert heat (almost 120°F in Needles) and the Midwest humidity and thunderstorm possibilities. So we purchased an enclosed trailer and towed it behind our F-250, unloading it at many of our overnight destinations for short drives.

Below is a short (well, maybe not so short) blog of our trip

#### Day 1 and 2 - Flagstaff, AZ

We originally planned on leaving early Saturday morning, but decided to leave Friday afternoon so we'd have more time with our son, Joel. We headed out a little after 2pm and with Friday "get out of town" traffic, we arrived in Flagstaff a little after 11pm. We spent all day Saturday with Joel and his girlfriend Jordan. We enjoyed afternoon thunderstorms (remember what rain is?) and test fitted an L-shaped awning Pam made for Joel's FJ Cruiser.

#### Day 3 – Amarillo, TX

We wanted to get an early start on Sunday since we were going to lose 2 time zone hours today. We were on the road by 6:30am. We stopped at a rest stop in Manuelito, NM, then lunch in Edgewood, NM. We arrived in Amarillo at 5:30pm.

On the way into town, we saw the famous Route 66 Cadillac Ranch off the highway. After we got settled into our hotel, we unloaded the TR2 and took it out to Cadillac Ranch where it got almost as much attention as the Cadillac's stuck in the ground. It was amazing to see so many people with spray paint cans covering the rainbow of colors adding their "touches" to the Cadillacs. One thing's for sure, those cars will never rust as they have over an inch thick coat of paint on them!



#### Day 4 - Springfield, MO

Since we didn't have any time zone changes on Monday, we slept in and didn't leave Amarillo until 8:15am. We stopped for lunch at in Stroud, OK. Oklahoma is a beautiful state! Very green with rolling hills and lots of trees. After lunch, we went under the world's largest McDonald's in Vinita, OK on Hwy 44. Best sign yet! "Road trip calories don't count!" We arrived in Springfield at 4:30pm.

After we got settled in the room, we walked to Route 66 which was just up the street. We saw an old classic Route 66 motel - the Rest Haven Court. We found a Missouri Route 66 sign too. We walked back to the hotel and after dinner at the Cracker Barrel, we took the TR2 out to get a photo with the Route 66 sign. We drove around town a bit more before heading back to the hotel.

#### Day 5 and 6 - Bloomington, IN

We wanted to get a little earlier start on Tuesday since we were losing another hour, so we were on the road at 7:35am. We had overcast skies, but it was another pretty drive! Very green and some wet roads then rain for a while. We transitioned from Hwy 44 to Hwy 70 and it was pretty too! Lots of farmland. We saw lots of "world's largest" signs too. We arrived in Bloomington at 4:15pm.

Joel's aunt lives in a small housing complex, but they had the perfect parking spot for our 41' long rig. They had orange cones out to keep others from parking



there! We visited for a while then went to Indiana University to walk around. We meet my cousin Craig for dinner at Mother Bear's Pizza. It was delicious! We realized it had been 9 years since we had all seen each other – one of the disadvantages of having family spread all around the country.

On Wednesday, Aunt Nancy, Joel and Pam left to meet cousin Lynn for lunch. Afterwards we went to the Indianapolis Motor Speedway museum and it was fabulous. Many of the winning cars from 1911-present were on display. There were trophies and lots of other memorabilia too. They had a tribute to Tony Stewart's retiring and Roger Penske's 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary. We took the VIP tour of the track that included kissing the bricks, the media center, top of the pagoda and victory circle, along with a lap around the track. Just awesome! If you're a racing buff and are ever in the Indianapolis area, a half day visit to the track is well worth it.

#### Day 7 - Indiana, PA

We woke up on Thursday and snuck out the downstairs door at 7:25am EDT. It is cloudy today. We took several back country roads and highways to Ohio and cut down to pick up a TR engine block Joel bought on eBay (a lot cheaper than shipping and another reason to take the truck!). The guy lives on a small property surrounded by fields of corn and soybeans. Very pretty! He was retired and loved working on cars. In his shop he was finishing up a Ferrari Mondial restoration and had several Mercedes laying around.

That was around 11:30am. We stopped for lunch soon after. We skirted around Columbus, OH. Lots of trees and less farmland after Columbus. More rolling hills than flat. Pennsylvania is much more hilly and lots more trees. Lots of town names ending in ville, town and burg. We had a few spats of rain on the way to Indiana. We arrived at the hotel at 3:45pm.

We unpacked all our stuff since we were there for 3 nights. We unloaded the TR2 and headed to The Roadster Factory (TRF) to register. It was about 25 min away. We saw lots of Triumphs on our way there and exchanged waves with all of them. We got registered and walked around the campground field. We talked to Charles Runyan, the owner, and he took a look at our car. He loved it! We decided to go to the Coventry Inn for dinner. Oh my! Very good food! It is an English-style pub/restaurant also owned by Charles. We took the Bimini off to drive home – it was so nice!

#### Day 8 - Summer Party Day 1

We started Friday with the Gymkhana which was just down the street. As we were heading there we saw another couple in a white TR3A and we followed each other. When we parked at the Gymkhana, we introduced ourselves and started talking with Paul and Terry from Michigan. Pam saw a yellow TR3A parked nearby with TN plates so we started talking to them too. They were Brarry and Barbara. By the time we were done with the Gymkhana, we were all making plans to have dinner together that night!

The Gymkhana was fun! Lots of obstacles from collecting tennis balls on the top of cones to hula-hooping to tandem "skiing" to the fan belt toss to the nut-n-bolt challenge to the passenger steering thru a slalom course to the rope-arc drive to the flimsy water bucket carry. We came in 5<sup>th</sup> place overall even though our TR2 couldn't turn as tightly as the "modern" cars with the rack-and-pinion steering!

Joel did the LeMans start challenge too, and came in mid-pack. Lots of hot rods! We then went to The Roadster Factory in nearby Armagh to eat lunch. Joel went to Randy Phillippi's LeMans TRS tech talk. Charles owns two of the 4 ever built and one of them is undergoing a full restoration by Randy. For those of you who don't know, Triumph raced the TRS cars at LeMans in 1960 and 1961, doing quite well in the last year. Pam sat and enjoyed the view in the shade and talked to several people.

The car show was Friday evening and was in downtown Indiana in front of the Coventry Inn. It was a <u>Couleurs</u> d'Elegance where classes are by the color of the car instead of model. There were only 5-6 in the black class, and our TR2 was the oldest car of all the cars there. There were lots of (Signal) red and (British Racing) green cars. Several GT6's too – that was fun to see.

We had dinner at the Coventry Inn with the other two couples while the car show was still going on – it was a great time. On the way home, the car started missing after it warmed up. Hmmm...

#### Day 9 - Summer Party Day 2

We got up earlier on Saturday as we needed to be at the hill climb event by 9:00am. It was held on the Indiana University of Pennsylvania campus. We had to have a safety check and then Joel went in the first heat. Pam walked to the finish line and watched the first heat do their two runs. Pam then went back to meet Joel and it was her turn. It was a blast! The first run was faster than the second for both of us as the

It was a pretty drive of 20 miles thru the Pennsylvania countryside. We had to maintain an exact speed. It was a lot of fun! We parked the trailer and truck by the barn and took our stuff up to the house. Joel took the TR2 out to put in the garage and we hung out at the cabin the rest of the afternoon.

#### Day 11 thru 13 – Layover Days at SMF

We enjoyed 3 very lazy days at the Farm. We did things like reading, going for walks, fixing a bench for Joel's mom, picking pears to make fresh pear jam, etc. Every afternoon we'd grab a

On Tuesday, we jumped in the TR2 and went to breakfast at a small country place called The Cabin. Afterwards, we went to the Sweetwater Valley Farm which is a dairy farm and specialized in a large variety of wonderful cheeses. Needless to say, we came home with quite a bit. The car started missing again, so we went back to an auto parts store we saw to pick up a coil to try to fix the TR2. We drove back to the farm on wonderful GREEN twisty country roads.

Joel installed the new coil and it seemed to fix the missing problem! The car started right up and ran much more smoothly. Pam's high school friend who moved to Tennessee quite a few years ago came to visit on Wednesday and Pam took her for a ride in the TR2. She loved it!! On the way back, Betsey had the

Ferrier there to shoe some of the horses and he liked the car and took lots of photos. He likes fixing up older Ford Broncos. Joel took his dad for a ride before "stowing" the TR2, but at the top of the driveway (it's about a half mile long), the TR2 died! They turned it around and coasted back to Betsey's where Joel tried again to start it, but no go. Joel's dad got the John Deere tractor and they towed it to the trailer. Joel was able to get it in without us pushing it by using the starter with it in gear. That's a British car for ya! Joel pulled a spark plug to see if there was any spark. None. Hmmm??? Coil again?

#### Day 14 - Little Rock, AR

We left SMF at 6:50am on Thursday to start our trek home. We met our sister-inlaw in Nashville for breakfast and were back on the road by 11:15am (we gained an hour back between Knoxville and Nashville). We stopped for lunch just over the border in Arkansas. Just as we were getting on the freeway, we heard a "pop and whoosh", which was not a good sound! Joel checked the gauges and saw there was no turbo boost, so he thought the turbo blew. We pulled over and didn't see anything catastrophic, so we



kept driving hoping to limp our way to Little Rock. Pam looked up Ford dealers and found one in North Little Rock so she called to "make an appointment".

The clouds and blue skies are amazing. Arkansas is very flat which was good without any turbo boost, thus power! We arrived at the Ford dealer at 3:30pm. They took the truck right in and within an hour determined that the hose between the turbo and intercooler blew. They ordered a new one from Memphis and had it FedEx'ed overnight.

Unfortunately with the TR2 out of commission, we had to rent a car for the night. We got settled in the hotel before walking to dinner. It was a mile walk and it's very hot there, but it was nice to stretch our legs. We ate at Cilantro's Grill and it was excellent!

#### Day 15 - Santa Rosa, NM

With nowhere to go until the truck was repaired we slept in. We checked out at 10:45 and went to the dealers to see how things were going. We saw the truck out and were told it was fixed, but they wanted to let it cool down and take it out for another test drive to make sure all was well. After another test run, it was given the thumbs up and we were on our way by 12:15pm.

We wanted to make up time so we decided to head to our original Friday destination in Santa Rosa, NM. We stopped in Alma, AR (where we were to stay last night) for lunnch. Oklahoma and Texas are flat! Not many trees and getting browner as we get farther west.

We stopped in McLean, TX for dinner at the Red River Steakhouse on Route 66! After dinner, we drove west into the sunset! We finally made it to Santa Rosa NM at 10:45pm. Sleep!!

#### Day 16 - Flagstaff, AZ

We woke on Saturday to cloudy skies. We missed the transition from grass plains to scrub brush high desert as we arrived at night. We left Santa Rosa at 6:10am. Even in the desert, we wanted to look out the window! So pretty our county is! We stopped for diesel in the town of Moriarty, NM on Old Route 66. As we drove through, we saw some old cool signs.

Albuquerque has beautiful freeway walls and medians! After Albuquerque, the terrain got more southwestish with plateaus, cliffs and hills. We arrived in Flagstaff 12:30pm.

Son Joel and his friends were in their final prep for a 6 day 4-wheel drive adventure on the Alpine Loop in Colorado, so we hung out with them and helped them prepare. (continued on top of next page)

#### Day 17 - Home

We left Flagstaff at 6:20am, anxious to get home after being on the road so many days. We had fun charting our Route 66 trip from last fall. It was interesting to see how in the landscape changed from short green grass with scrub brush to gravel, rocks and sand with scrub brush and cactus. As we got closer to Barstow, less scrub brush and only low clumps of brush.

We stopped in Little Rock (CA, not AR!) for lunch. We arrived home at 2:30pm.

Our neighbor and fellow club member, Sean Morreale helped us push the TR2 into the garage. Pam unpacked the truck and Joel unpacked the trailer. Afterwards we took a dip in the pool to cool off. At least this heat had no humidity associated with it! We dinner ate in the paddock (what we've decided to call our new Triumph garage) and after dinner, Joel swapped coils in the TR2 again. Still no go. So he changed out the electronic ignition module for good old fashioned points and...it started right up! He will need to talk to the folks at Pertronix about this as the module is still under warranty.

It was a great trip. The only thing we didn't get to do was visit the Route 66 Museum just down the street from our hotel in Santa Rosa, NM. Oh well, I guess that means we'll just have to go that way again! We are off to Monterey for Car Week on Wednesday but that's a story for another time.

In total, we traveled 5,340 miles with a total driving time of 86 hours over 10 driving days. Did we get tired of each other's company? NO! We'd do it again in a heartbeat!




